The most common drug combination among youth in impaired driving crashes is alcohol and cannabis.<sup>3</sup>





When alcohol is involved, a young Texas driver is

15x



more likely to die compared to young drivers in crashes that don't involve alcohol.<sup>3</sup>



is the average age of first use in Texas.<sup>2</sup>

of Texas high school students have used cannabis at least once in their lifetime.<sup>2</sup>



Cannabis is the most commonly used illicit drug among Texas youth.<sup>2</sup>

of Texas crash fatalities involved THC, based on toxicology reports.<sup>3</sup>



Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens.<sup>1</sup>



In Texas, nearly

1/4
